Scientific name:

Litoria aurea

Status:

Vulnerable.

Diet:

They like to eat insects, worms, flies, crayfish.

They are even known to be cannibals and eat other frogs!

Fun fact:

At up to 11cm long, it's one of Australia's largest frogs. The female frogs are bigger than the males.

Where are they found?

They can be found in coastal swamps, wetlands, marshes, dams, ditches, and forests in south-eastern Australia.



How are we helping?

We were lucky enough to find some at the Dutson Downs property we manage in 2011 during a survey.

Since then we've worked with experts and continued to run amphibian surveys every year to monitor their numbers.

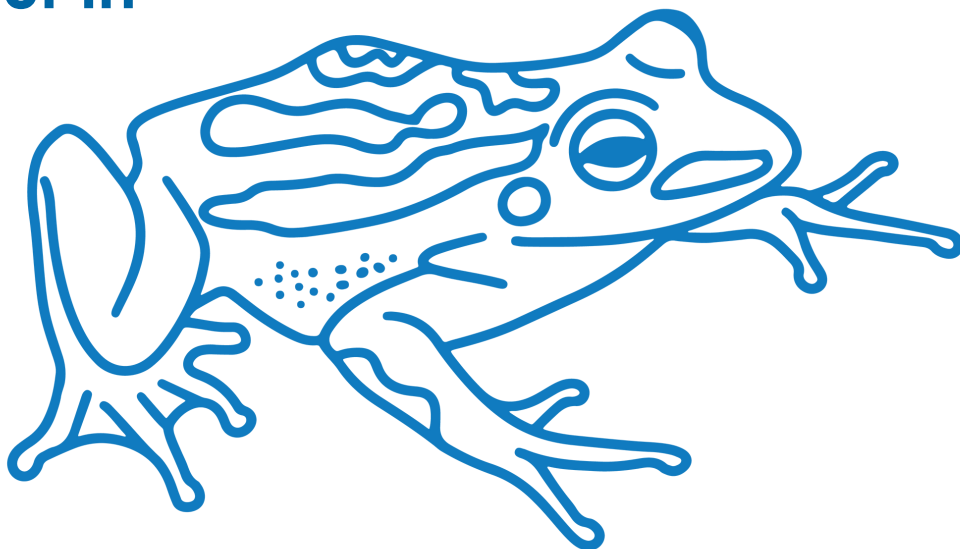
